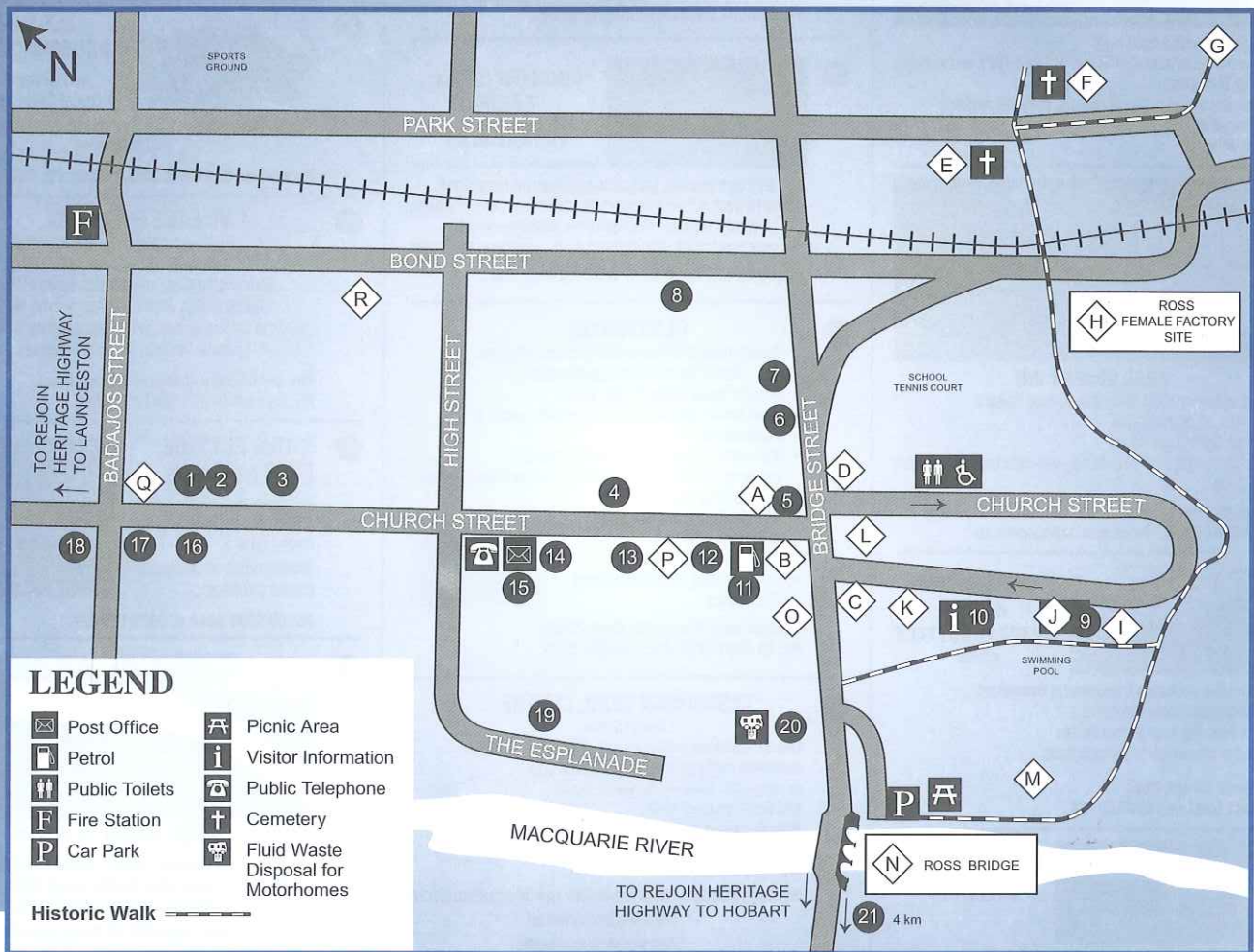


# ROSS
